

Pastors Voice

Anti-Catholic myths
Catholics invented Purgatory, it's unscriptural.
Praying for the dead is useless.

Non-Catholic Christian discomfort with Purgatory is, "You can't find the word purgatory in the bible and the idea that you can pray anyone who has died into paradise smacks of salvation by good works, undermining the Reformation doctrine of Justification by Faith Alone. The dead are either in heaven or hell," there's no middle ground, and certainly nothing the living can do to change it."

When a Protestant says, "this doctrine is based on books that don't belong in the Bible," he has in mind 2 Maccabees 12 in which Judah Maccabee and his men pray for their fallen comrades who had fallen asleep in righteousness so that they may be "freed of their sins in the afterlife, and it was a holy and pious thought for them to do this." Thus 2 Maccabees endorses praying for the dead that they may be loosed from the consequences of their sins. Remember, though, 1 and 2 Maccabees were removed at the time of the Reformation. Protestants don't regard this passage as Scripture, but Catholics do, and it is thus legitimate for us to appeal to it.

Interestingly praying for the dead is a Jewish practice that has carried over to Catholic belief and practice. It is found in a Jewish practice called the Mourner's Kaddish, which is tantamount to prayers for the dead. Jews continue to pray for the dead today, particularly using the Mourner's Kaddish, recited daily during the first year following the loss of a parent, or for the first 30 days following the loss of a sibling, spouse, or child. It is also said once a year on the anniversary of a person's death

The Catholic Church affirmed the doctrine of Purgatory as early as the 4th century, and again at the Council of Trent (held in three parts from 1545 to 1563, prompted by the Reformation). The Roman Catholic teaching on purgatory reflects our understanding of the communion of saints. We are connected to the saints in heaven, the saints-in-waiting in purgatory and other believers here on earth. "All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven" CCC 1030
